MONUMENT VALLEY

North of the Santa Fe main line in Arizona spreads this unusual valley guarded by its incredible rock sentinels. Unscalable and aloof, these colorful spires, shafts and buttes rise from sloping pedestals on the valley plains.

A few Navajo families with their flocks of sheep are the only inhabitants of this vast valley. It is reported that these families came into the valley to escape from early Indian wars and through the years the valley has become a shrine to this little group.

Monument Valley is one of the most unusual scenic creations in the world. It is a part of the great variety of scenery that vacationists can enjoy in the vast southwest territory served by the Santa Fe Railway.
